

Scholar Spotlight: Makenzie Greenwood



Taking a drive down Main Street in Hampstead, MD, you'll notice the makings of a charming small town: family-owned restaurants, auto shops, salons, and churches. Behind one particular church, Makenzie Greenwood is changing the lives of people in her community.

A two-time Carson Scholar and fifth grader at Spring Garden Elementary, Makenzie crafted the plans for Hampstead's Little Free Pantry at the age of

nine. Inspired by Little Free Libraries that are now staples in many neighborhoods, she began drafting proposals and rounding up helpers to make the pantry a reality. With the help of her church and a local scouting group, the Little Free Pantry opened in January 2017

and has since been accessed over 600 times by people both donating

and taking food.

Makenzie's reason for opening the pantry is simple: "I thought it would be a nice way for me to help people in my community." The pantry, which requires no paperwork and is open 24/7, is stocked by members of the community with everything from non-perishable food to laundry detergent. Makenzie visits several times a week to organize donations and restock the shelves. While there, she is able to see the impact of her efforts through anonymous notes of gratitude left by those who utilize the pantry.



Makenzie is already looking towards the future of the Little Free Pantry with hopes of opening others around Maryland. Her work has not gone unnoticed, receiving a variety of honors including the Baltimore Orioles Birdland Hero Award, the William Donald Shaefer Helping People Award and a Governor's Citation by Governor Larry Hogan. Most recently, Makenzie received the WBFF FOX45 Pay It Forward Award, including a check that she plans to use to offer a grant to help other kids open pantries in their communities.




When she isn't checking on the pantry, Makenzie can be found volunteering for her school's Safety Patrol, practicing her clarinet and ukulele, and swimming for a local swim team. Each summer, she helps the Sea Turtle Preservation Society in Florida by taking stranded baby sea turtles to the facility so that they can be rehabilitated and released back into the wild. One day, she hopes to be a fourth grade social studies teacher.

Down the road, Makenzie plans to visit schools, churches and scouting groups to share her story and encourage other kids to start their own service projects in their neighborhoods.

Are You Graduating in 2018?



Congratulations on your upcoming high school graduation! With so many things to prepare for your first year of college, don't forget about your scholarship payout.

Scholarship monies are paid directly to the college or university at which you will be a student. Payouts can only be completed after verifying that you have been accepted and will be enrolled full-time at an accredited institution within the United States for the upcoming semester. Students must be enrolled in a bachelor's-degree-track (four-year) program to receive their payout. Scholarship monies can be used towards academic expenses including tuition, room and board, or books.

Your scholarship is a one-time scholarship, but we do offer the option to request a full or partial payout. Students who have other scholarships that cover much of their academic expenses often request a partial payout and use our scholarship money towards books. We also offer students the option to defer their scholarship payout. Payouts may be

deferred for up to three years after high school graduation.

The Carson Scholars Fund will only make payouts twice a year – for the fall and spring semesters. We cannot accommodate payout requests for summer or winter classes.

Balance statements and Payout Request Forms for the fall 2018 semester will be made available to all eligible scholars in late May/early June. This information will be mailed and emailed to you. The Payout Request Form must be completed and submitted back to the CSF office by July 6, 2018. Checks will be mailed to colleges on July 16, 2018 for the fall semester. Any Payout Request Forms received between now and then will be held until July. All Payout Request Forms received after July 6, 2018 will be held for payout for the spring 2019 semester.

Winter Reading Room Openings

Sid and Kyra Ferenc Foundation

Good things come in threes - from fairytales (*Three Little Pigs, Three Little Kittens*, etc.) to Hollywood blockbusters to our Constitution which promises a trio of good things: Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness. In February, the Ben Carson Reading Project hit the trifecta with the creation of three new Ben Carson Reading Rooms sponsored by the Sid and Kyra Ferenc Foundation. Two reading room sites, Banyan Creek Elementary and Rolling Green Elementary, are located in South Florida and the third location is in Kyra Ferenc's hometown of Cascade, Idaho.



On the morning of February 6, **Banyan Creek Elementary** in Delray Beach hosted its grand opening ceremony and ribbon cutting. The school celebrated this new resource by hosting an all-school assembly. During the ceremony, the fourth graders, accompanied by two student ukulele players, raised their voices in song to *What Can One Little Person Do*. The song's lyrics were altered to reflect Dr. Carson's academic journey. The school is located near the ocean; therefore, they opted for a marine themed reading room. The mural features an under-the-ocean scene. Images of dolphins, seahorses and turtles can be seen frolicking under

the sea. The focal point of the mural features a mighty octopus encased in a sunken treasure chest. Its large outstretched tentacles are wrapped around a book. In this reading room, students are learning that books truly are a treasure for a curious mind.



Later in the afternoon Mrs. Candy Carson, along with Sid and Kyra Ferenc, traveled to **Rolling Green Elementary** in Boynton Beach to open their Dr. Seuss inspired reading room. The walls in this colorful room are filled with Dr. Seuss' book characters including Horton, Thing One and Thing Two, Yertyl the Turtle and everyone's playful favorite, The Cat in the Hat. Dr. Seuss quotes are placed strategically on the walls reminding students that "The more that you read, the more things you will know. The more that you learn, the more places you'll go."

The third reading room, located in **Cascade Schools**, opened a week later. This reading room is the first to open in Idaho and adopted a Think Big theme. The mural is of a young girl reading a book. Stars are floating off the pages traveling above the girl's head, symbolizing the ideas and knowledge that

can be obtained by reading a good book. This reading room is a full-sized classroom and offers a variety of seating arrangements. A built-in bookshelf covers an entire wall and is home to a collection of over 600 books.



The Friedman Charitable Foundation

Children love the mystery of outer space. They imagine what it would be like to travel to distant planets and explore other galaxies. Students at **Woodholme Elementary** in Pikesville, Maryland will now be able to fuel their imaginations in the school's newly created space-themed reading room. Upon entering the room, your eyes are immediately drawn to a hand painted rocket ship, however, this rocket is unlike any other that you may have seen. Instead of being made out of metal, this fuselage consists of handcrafted book spines. Two astronauts flank the books as the planets float around them. Another unique feature of this room is a handmade red rocket bookcase. Floating bookshelves hold some of the most popular books in the reading



room. Children can find their favorite titles including *Clifford the Big Red Dog, Diary of a Wimpy Kid,* and the *I Survived* series, just to name a few. This is the 10th reading room to be sponsored by Louis and Phyllis Friedman and the fifth to be located in Pikesville area schools.

Donor Spotlight: Richard Herron
