What is the Carson Scholars Fund?

Our Founders, Our Missions

The Carson Scholars Fund is a 501 (c)(3) nonprofit organization founded in 1994 by now retired, world renowned neurosurgeon, Dr. Benjamin Carson and his wife, Candy, to address the education crisis ubiquitous to our country. The Carson Scholars Fund operates under an educational mission.

The Carson Scholarship Program

The Carson Scholarship Program works with educators to recognize and reward young students who prioritize their education and use it to create solutions within their communities. With the belief that educators know their students best, the scholarship program begins with an educator nomination. A student must have a 3.75 or higher GPA. In addition, the student must be actively participating in a community service project(s). Once nominated, a potential scholar completes an application along with an essay and letter of recommendation. An independent panel of judges score the applications and select new winners. New Carson Scholars receive a \$1,000 college scholarship (held in trust), an Olympic-sized medal, a certificate and an invitation to a celebration in their honor. At the celebration, families, peers, educators and community leaders are invited to recognize these young scholars and their remarkable achievements.

Each year, current scholars are encouraged to reapply for recognition. The repeat recognition affirms their commitment to persevering and continuing to develop the skills needed to be compassionate leaders in adulthood.

The program is merit-based with the belief that every child has the ability to develop their brain through a commitment to education. The service component of the award was established because it is implicit that being smart is not enough. Developing compassionate leadership is essential. The Carson Scholarship Program aims to cultivate an environment where learners become leaders.

The Ben Carson Reading Project

Our second initiative is designed to combat illiteracy and promote leisure reading as a key to unlocking a child's full potential. Reading rooms promote an encouraging attitude towards lifelong reading and learning. Ben Carson Reading Rooms are vibrant spaces located within a school.



The Carson Scholarship Program

What is the Carson Scholarship Program and why was it created?

For young Benjamin Carson, the future looked bleak. He was being raised by a single mother who worked multiple jobs performing domestic work. Ben's mother, Sonya, only had a third-grade education. The family was living in an underserved community and Ben was not doing well in school. His mother, determined to break the cycle of poverty for her young sons, observed the habits of the successful people she worked for. She realized education was the key to changing her children's future. She established rules regarding reading and schoolwork and involved her boys in the consequences of their actions. Dr. Carson credits his mother's insight and logic for his success and the success of his brother. Her resolve changed the trajectory of their lives.

The Carson Scholarship Program invests in discovering promising young students from across the country who make the choice to prioritize their education. After spending a great deal of time in schools, Dr. and Mrs. Carson saw visual evidence of the extra-curricular activities being celebrated but felt that the academics did not always receive the same level of recognition and celebration.

Based on their own life experiences and his work as a neurosurgeon, Dr. and Mrs. Carson hoped to use their influence to encourage and motivate young students to persevere. They recognize the sacrifice a child must make to achieve and maintain exceptional grades. They also know that in order for a child to stay motivated it often takes

the influence of educators, parents and the community. The scholarship and recognition are a piece of the puzzle, often with great impact on a child's life. When a child feels that their actions are valued, it is more likely they will continue to replicate the actions. Quite often it also encourages peers of the individual to emulate the behaviors.

The program has seen great success in schools who receive repeat funding either through endowments or annual funding. Students, parents, educators and the community reap the rewards of the program.

Ultimately, the dream of the Carsons' is to have a Carson Scholar in every school in the country. The program is always looking to expand. As a national organization, we recognize that it takes an army of individuals who know their communities best.



WHO I AM:

My name is Else Drooff, and I am a five-time Carson Scholar. I was born and raised in Annapolis, MD, and am a proud graduate of Anne Arundel County Public Schools, where I served as the Student Member of the Board of Education from 2013-2014. I graduated cum laude from Dartmouth College in 2018, where I majored in geography. I received the Student Legacy Award and Dean & Chaplain's Award. Most importantly, I founded the Dartmouth Education Society.

SUCCESS STORY

Until recently, I considered my time on the AACPS Board of Education to be the catalyst for my career interest in educational leadership. Yet, in reflecting on my educational journey, I think the seed must have been planted even earlier than that. When I was nominated for the Carson Scholarship by my fourth-grade teacher, Mrs. Willison, it was the first time that somebody—other than a family member—told me that I could be a leader. That I was already a leader. And although I would go on to receive the Carson Scholarship several times, it was that first nomination that transformed my life. Because I naively believed her.

After Dartmouth, I went on to intern for an EdTech start-up that aimed to improve the teacher hiring process before joining the Santa Fe Dreamers Project to provide pro-bono immigration legal services to DACA recipients, victims of abuse & human trafficking, and asylum-seekers. Last year, I moved to Bologna, Italy to complete my first year of graduate school with Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS). Currently, I am interning in Bogotá, Colombia with another EdTech startup focused on providing greater professional development resources to Latin American teachers. Over the next two years, I will continue to work toward my dual Master of International Relations and Master of Business Administration with SAIS and the University of Virginia Darden School of Business, respectively. When I finish graduate school, I have every intention of pursuing a lifelong career in education.

Fellow Carson Scholar alum, Antar Tichavakunda, wrote about his passion for 'the power of narratives on impacting educational policy.' This struck a chord with me. Whether you are a White student growing up in Annapolis or a Black student growing up in Washington, DC, the narrative that you construct about yourself- often heavily influenced by the adults around you – is everything.
